## Analysis of Proposed Consent Order to Aid Public Comment In the Matter of Tender Corporation, File No. 0823188

The Federal Trade Commission ("FTC" or "Commission") has acepted, subject to final approval, an agreement containing conset order from Tende Corporation, a corporation ("respondent".

The proposet consent orden ben placed on the publicercord for thirty (30) days for reception of comments by interested persons. Comments received during this period will become part of the public record. After thirty (30) days, the Commission will again review the agreement and the comments recipied and will deide whethe it should withdraw from the agreement or make inal the agreement's proposed der.

This matter involves Tende maketing and sales Fresh Bath brand moist hand and body wipes, pakaged in plastic that prominentlytates "bio-degradeable" without qualification on the front of the pakage. Tender's website and protional materials also made claim. According to the FTC complaint, respondent represented that Fresh Bath Wipes and Fresh Bath Travel Wipes and thie pakages will completely break down and eturn to nature.e., decomposento elements found in nature within a reasonably short period of time feer customary disposal. The complaint alless respondent's bioder gadable claim is false because a substantial majority of total household waste disposed of either in larity, incinerators, or recycling facilities and these customary disposal methods do not present conditions that would allow for the wipes and the packaging to completely break down and eturn to nature.e., decomposento elements found in nature within a reasonably short period of time. The complaint further alleges that respondent failed to have substantiation for the biodegradable claim. The proposed consist order contains provisions designed to prevent respondent from engaging in similar acts and pratices in the future

Part IA of the poposed ordeprohibits responded from makinga representation that certain of its products ardegadable unless the peresentation is true, not mishding and substantiated by ompetent and reliablescientific evidence. Part IB prohibits respondent from making anyother environmental berfet claim about such porducts, unless at the time the representation is made, it is truthful and not misleading and substantiated by ompetent and reliable evidence, which when appropriate must be competent and eliable scientific evidence.

Part II of the proposed order requires respondent to specify whether its degradability claim applies to the produpackage, or components of either

Parts II through VI requireresponded to keep copies of relevant advetisements and materials substantiating daims made in the advertisements, to provide copies of the order to cetain of their pesonnel; to notify the Commission of changes in corporate structure that might affect compliance obligations under the der; and to file compliance epods with the Commission and respond to other requests from FTC staff. Part VII provides that the order will terminate after twenty (20) years under ertain circumstanes.

The purpose of this analysis is to facilitate public comment on the proposed order. It is not intended to constitute an official interpretation of the agreement and proposed order or to modfy in any way their terms.
