Dear Mr. Wernikoff:

We received your submissions on behalf of CURT Group (“CURT” or the “Company”). During our review, we discussed concerns that marketing materials may have overstated the extent to which CURT products are made in the United States. Specifically, although CURT makes custom hitches in the United States, and the Company performs certain manufacturing processes for other products in the United States, CURT also sells products that are imported or contain significant imported content.

As discussed, unqualified U.S.-origin claims in marketing materials – including claims that products are “Made,” “Built,” or “Manufactured” in the USA – likely suggest to consumers that all products advertised in those materials are “all or virtually all” made in the United States.¹

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United States, any claim of U.S. origin should be adequately qualified to avoid consumer deception about the presence or amount of foreign content. In order to be effective, any qualifications or disclosures should be sufficiently clear, prominent, and understandable to prevent deception.”²

To avoid deceiving consumers, CURT implemented a remedial action plan to update and qualify its representations. This plan included: (1) updating marketing materials to clarify or correct U.S.-origin representations; (2) updating social media platforms; (3) providing updated materials to dealer/distributors; and (4) continuing to monitor the accuracy of dealer/distributor claims, including by spot-checking dealer sites.

As discussed, it is appropriate for the Company to promote the fact that it employs workers and performs certain processes in the United States, provided that marketing materials do not overstate the extent to which CURT’s products are made in the United States. Additionally, FTC staff is available to work with companies to craft qualified claims that serve the dual purposes of conveying non-deceptive information to consumers and highlighting work done in the United States.

Based on CURT’s actions and other factors, the staff has decided not to pursue this investigation any further. This action should not be construed as a determination that there was no violation of Section 5 of the Federal Trade Commission Act, 15 U.S.C. § 45.
