Based on the foregoing, the Commission alleges that Respondent violated the MagnusonMoss Warranty Actandregulations promulgated thereunded engaged in deceptive acts or practices in violation of Section 5(a) oFTIC Act.

The Proposed Order contains injunctive provisional dressing the alleged deceptive conductSection Iprohibits Respondent from property or implicitly conditioning a warranty on a consumer's use of any article or service which is identifie by brand, trade, or corporate name, unless the article or service is offered for free or the Commission has issued a waiver to the company, or from otherwise violating the Warranty Act or the Rules promulgated thereunder. Section II prohibits Respondent from representing to consumers, expressly or by implication (h) (at) its warranties will be void if they use thir party parts or services or if they modify or alter the product without authorization (b) as a condition of warranty coverage, or within the written
