
alone in articulating such concerns.⁸ While it is true that the current Majority has prioritized controversial and unlawful rulemakings over the last four years, as we turn the page I believe the Commission should redirect its efforts and resources toward enforcement against fraud and, *only* where appropriate, rulemakings that ensure the Commission can robustly prosecute fraud and provide consumers redress. Today's amendment is consistent with this new direction I believe the Commission should chart. And it is sound policy that fits squarely within the Commission's storied past and its mission to protect the American people from fraudsters and scammers.
